





Navigating Applicant Barriers

The two most common barriers are:

- Finding/securing a location.
- Start-up capital.

Measures we are taking to assist:

- Reaching out to local authorities.
- Consistent contact from Licensing Specialists.
- Monthly check-ins from the Social Equity Team.
- Availability to meet with local jurisdictions and collaborate in supporting applicants.

Social Equity Plan – One-Time Reimbursement

Legislation recently passed that encourages licensees to submit a social equity plan outlining measures they will take to promote social equity in their community. After submitting a completed plan, the licensee can receive a one-time license fee reimbursement per entity.

- The Social Equity team has developed a procedure and a social equity plan application for licensees to utilize.
- The social equity plan application will be available on the Social Equity page starting February 1st.

Social Equity Rulemaking

Implementing E2SSB 5080

Purpose of Rulemaking

- Modify the current rules (Chapter 314-55 WAC) to implement the 2023 legislation for expanding and improving the Cannabis Social Equity Program.
 - Rulemaking began on Nov. 8, 2023 (CR-101 filed as WSR 23-23-062)

Understanding the Rulemaking Process

- The Inquiry Phase (CR-101)
 - Stakeholder engagement
 - Rule development, drafting, and analysis
- The Proposal Phase (CR-102)
 - Public hearing/comments
 - Agency responds to comments
- The Adoption Phase (CR-103)
 - Board votes to approve rules
 - Rules become effective

Tentative Rule Development Timeline

- Informal public comment period will close on Feb. 29, 2024, at 11:59 P.M.
- April/May 2024
 - Develop policy options to consider and draft proposed rules.
- May 2024
 - Request Board approval of CR-102.
- June/July 2024
 - Request Board approval of CR-103.
- Aug./Sept. 2024
 - Rules become effective.





Disproportionately Impacted Areas

- Disproportionately Impacted Areas (DIAs) are one of the four requirements that may qualify an applicant for the Social Equity Program.
- Last legislative session, the criteria changed for what qualifies as a DIA.
- The new criteria defines DIAs as census tracts that are in the top 15% in at least two of the following indicators:
 - High rate of people living under the federal poverty level;
 - High rate of people who did not graduate from high school;
 - High rate of unemployment; or
 - High rate of people receiving public assistance.
- LCB contracted with a third-party to pull and analyze the data, and another to map the data.






Next Steps:

- The new draft maps will be shared on our website this afternoon:
 - Use the Address Lookup Map to search for a specific address to determine whether it was in a DIA.
 - To review of the DIA census tracts across the state, maps are viewable by decade: 1980, 1990, 2000, and 2010.
- LCB would like to seek feedback from the community to consider if additional indicators should be used in determining these areas.
