Description of the Issue

The purpose of this Issue Paper is to request approval from the Board to file the first stage of rulemaking (CR 101) to draft rules for private label spirits.

Why is rule making necessary?

Rules are needed to clarify the requirements for private label spirits between a distiller, craft distiller, or spirits certificate of approval holder and a spirits retailer.

Process

The rule making process begins by announcing LCB's intent to change the existing rule by filing a CR 101 form. This allows staff and stakeholders to begin discussing necessary rule changes. At the CR 101 stage of the process, no proposed language is offered. The public may comment on the subject of this rulemaking during the designated comment period. Notice will be sent to all who have indicated that they want to receive notice of rule changes. The notice will identify the public comment period and where comments can be sent. Based on public input received, staff will draft proposed changes for presentation to the Board at the next phase of the rule making process.

Purpose:

The purpose of this interim policy is to clarify the requirements for production of private label spirits between a distiller, craft distiller, or spirits certificate of approval holder and a spirits retail licensee.

Policy Statement

- (1) Distilleries, craft distilleries, or spirit certificate of approval holders may produce private label spirits for spirits retailers under the following conditions:
 - There may be no exclusivity between the producer and the retailer for the private label spirits product. The product must be reasonably available to all retailers licensed to sell the spirits product;
 - A copy of the contract between the producer and the spirits retailer for all private label spirits products must be submitted to the board; and
 - The distiller, craft distiller, or spirits certificate of approval holder must submit a TTB certificate of label approval for each private label produced, to the board for review.
