2020 - COVID-19 Response: At a Glance

Helping licensees stay open and the public stay healthy Creative alterations and new allowances that evolved throughout 2020

Distilleries were approved to temporarily make hand sanitizer, or for distillers to sell distilled alcohol for sanitizing purposes.

The Liquor and Cannabis Board took emergency actions, and made other rule changes and modifications

- Allowed late payments of taxes and fees without penalties
- ♦ Allowed cocktail kits to-go with sales of food
- ♦ Allowed bottles of spirits with sales of food
- Allowed mixed cocktails to-go with sales of food
- Allowed delivery services for beer and wine
- Allowed bar seating for minors to create additional usable space
- Sped up approval for outdoor alcohol service
- ♦ Helped licensees that don't serve food (nightclubs, breweries, wineries, taverns) to quickly transition to a license that would allow them to stay open during
- ♦ Allowed curbside sales of cannabis
- ♦ Allowed children under 16 to be with adult caregiver on premises of producer / processors

Received 1,788 requests for facility or operations alterations

- ♦ 822 requests were temporary alterations for liquor establishments to change their premises to comply with guidelines
- 996 of these requests included added activities like internet sales, delivery, and curbside service
- ♦ Received 1,414 more alteration requests than in 2019 a 378% increase

Other actions and impacts included:

- ♦ Working with licensees who needed assistance interpreting changing guidance
- ♦ Fullfilling public records requests for COVID-19 related documents
- ♦ Developing guidance and providing information and support via email, web, and listserve channnels
- Supporting the state's Emergency Operations Center
